„Consultation Ethics“

Arild Aambø ist Mediziner, Musiker und Senior Advisor bei NAKMI Norwegian Centre for Migration and Minority Health, Oslo, Norwegen. Seit den 1990er Jahren arbeitet er zum Thema Kommunikation mit PatientInnen, Gestaltung der Arzt-Patienten-Beziehung und Empowerment. Seine aktuellen Schwerpunkte sind Lebensstilveränderungen nach der Migration, Mentale Gesundheit, Diabetes.

Impulsvortrag in englischer Sprache; Diskussion deutsch und englisch.

Abstract:

Within the medical profession, heated discussions have evolved around ethical problems concerning the ultimate limits of life; limits that modern technology has moved beyond social and economic capacity. In contrast, ethical concerns regarding ordinary, day-to-day medical encounters, what in the following I call 'consultation ethics', reside in the shadows. Moreover, while a host of laws, regulations, and directives influencing medical practice are implemented to secure patients' autonomy; that is, rights to confidentiality, informed consent and participation, less is said about how regularly occurring processes of medical assessment may contribute to the patients' suffering; a suffering probably experienced more deeply by people at the margin of society. And while several monographs have been written on issues like the clinical encounter, transactional analysis and medical decision theory, ethical dilemmas evolving in transcultural settings have been largely neglected.

In the workshop, we will take an uttering a Somali refugee made after encountering Norwegian doctors as our point of departure, and consider her problems in light of moral philosophers like Levinas, Honneth and Jonas together with the four tenets from our Western medical tradition: beneficence, non-maleficence, autonomy and justice.

Questions that we want to discuss and perhaps throw light on in the workshop are, among others:
To what extent are problems the Somali refugee experiences relevant to all patients – non-immigrants as well as immigrants?

To what extent are the moral philosophers above mentioned relevant in our modern, high-tech medical practice?
